6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum development is based on the time bound allocation and completion of fixed syllabus by adopting plans and methodologies. - Teaching and learning involved adequate advance preparation for effective inflow and communication of knowledge in keeping with the syllabi in the calendar year.
- Application of modern need based teaching aids is ensured. Library is an important part of academic infrastructure. Every effort is made to strengthen library by the supply of required books.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Examination and evaluation are the important part of academics. College follows all the examination related guidelines in letter and spirits and ensures their compliance through university approved assistant and senior superintendents.
